How long is the longest Golden Horn?

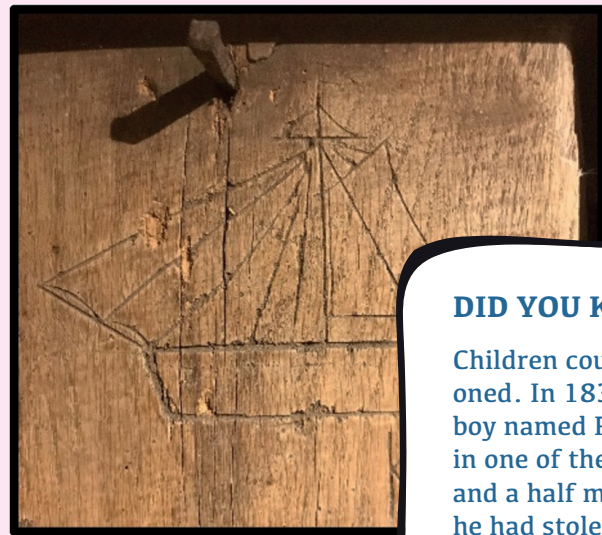

Kirsten Svendsdatter, who found the first Golden Horn, could have discovered it a week earlier. A week before, she accidentally kicked the horn with her foot but walked on, thinking it was a tree root.



DID YOU KNOW THAT ...

Children could also be imprisoned. In 1832, a 12-year-old boy named Rasmus was jailed in one of these cells for one and a half months because he had stolen money from an elderly woman.

Find the museum's prison, where real prisoners were once held! While in prison, some of them spent their time engraving letters and images on the walls of their cells.

In one of the cells, a man drew this ship. Can you find the ship and see which year the man was imprisoned?

DID YOU KNOW THAT ...

If you had lived in the Netherlands about 300 years ago, you could have trained as a tile painter. Children as young as 10 years old could start an apprenticeship as tile painters. The first thing they had to learn was painting the patterns in the corners of the tiles.

Many of the motifs on the Skærbæk tapestries are inspired by well-known fairy tales such as Sleeping Beauty and Cinderella.

On seven of the Skærbæk tapestries, you can see people. Some are easier to find than others, so look very carefully!

DID YOU KNOW THAT ...

The Kagmand in Tønder is the only one of its kind preserved in Denmark. The Kagmand is an executioner figure that was placed in the town square of Tønder (from 1699 until sometime in the 18th century) to serve as a deterrent to the citizens.

As a teenager, Wegner designed and built his first chair, using his mother's curtains as upholstery.

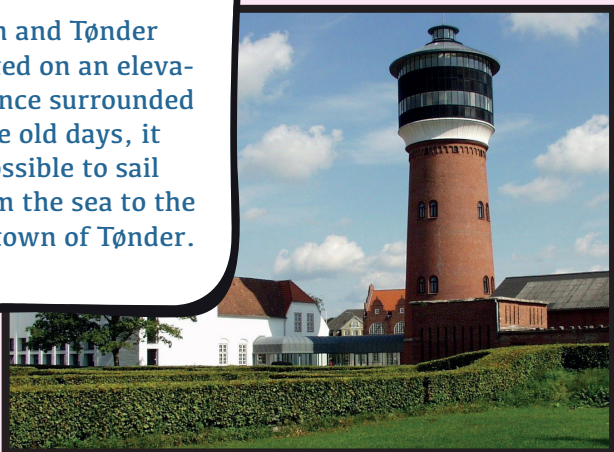
At the top of the water tower on the 4th floor, there is a chair called "Jakkens Hvile." The backrest of the chair looks like a clothes hanger.

Tønder Museum and Tønder Castle are located on an elevation that was once surrounded by water. In the old days, it was actually possible to sail all the way from the sea to the castle and the town of Tønder.

Right next to the museum, there used to be a castle. The castle was demolished about 250 years ago, but its foundations can still be seen from the tower, as they are marked by beech hedges.

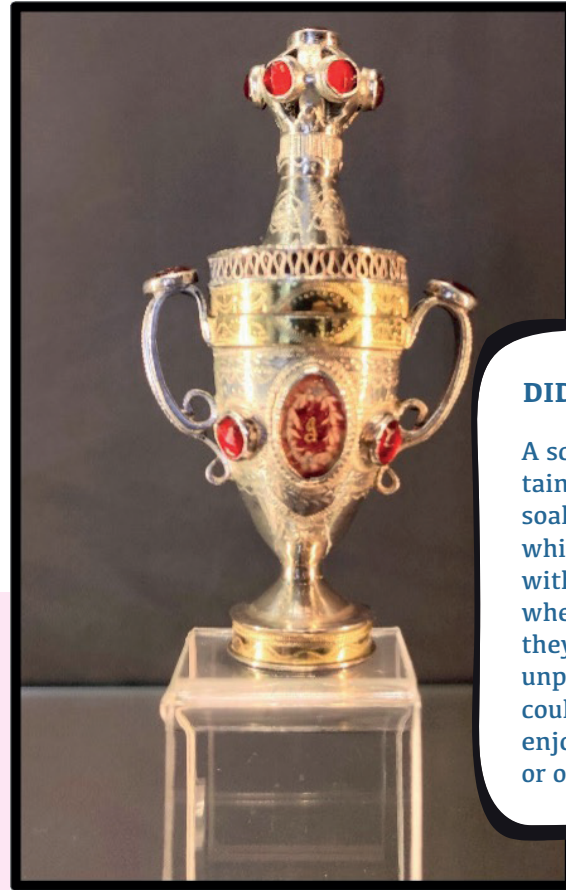
